A Puritan Thanksgiving Day



Isaiah 65:24 - "And it shall come to pass, that before they call, I will answer; and while they are yet speaking, I will hear."

Everyone raised in America knows how, in 1621, the Pilgrims invited the Indians over to thank God for their harvest, and held a celebration—the first Thanksgiving.

The Puritans also had a day of Thanksgiving ten years later in 1631. This second

day of Thanksgiving is almost completely forgotten by our society.

After the harvest that fall Governor William Bradford realized that there might not be enough crops to get them all through the winter. So he sent his ship, the Lyon, home to his wife and son with instructions to sell off some things from their estate and return the ship with food. After that, more shiploads of settlers, fleeing religious persecution in England, arrived completely without provisions and suffering the usual post-trip sickness. The colonists' winter supplies began to go down even faster than the governor had anticipated. Eventually, all the corn was gone and the clam beds were emptied. The Indians

quit trading their own corn as they were running low also. The Lyon had been so long away that she was given up for lost. So the governor declared a fast day before the Lord to seek his help. (They would have been fasting anyway.) But on the morning of the declared fast day, the Lyon arrived in the harbor laden with supplies. The Lyon had come upon a distressed ship at sea and had spent much time towing them to a safe port, delaying her mission. The ship was quickly unloaded and Governor Bradford declared the fast day to be a day of feasting unto the Lord instead. And so the colonists held a feast from the supplies off of the ship. The date was February 6, 1631.

Daily Giving Thanks

As we kick off the holiday season with a day of giving thanks to the Lord, it is good to consider carefully all that we should be thankful for. For some people this seems to be a difficult process, so they thank the Lord in general terms, such as, "All your blessings," and, satisfied with that, they sit down and eat

their turkey and watch the game. This is a clear sign that someone is out of practice in being thankful to God. If football players can practice continually and go through all that they do for a ring and a trophy, how much more then should we be in practice giving thanks to God every day. We can

start with thanking Him for the air we breathe, for sleep, for waking, for health, and go on from there as He directs us. Those who are in the habit of thanking God daily will take extra pleasure in a day devoted to giving thanks and will encourage others to do so as well.

The First Christmas Church Pageant

St. Francis of Assisi is credited with creating the first living nativity scene in 1223 at Greccio, Italy. Tired of seeing people attend the church service only to go out and engage in secular feasting and festivities, and exchanging excessive gifts, he put up a display of live people and an ox and a donkey inside a

cave on Mt. Lacerone. Then he and his fellow monks led people from the town out to the cave by torchlight to "see how he was placed in a manger." Crowds came all night as word spread through the town, and sang carols before the scene when they got there. There wasn't enough room in the cave for every-

one, so people waited their turn in the woods outside. It became a very popular custom almost immediately, and nativity displays rapidly spread throughout the churches. Even today, Christians cherish this yearly reminder as a way to focus on Jesus rather than secular activities.

Mary's Lifetime of Service

Being the chosen vessel to bring the Savior into the world may very well have been Mary's most important work for God. Later, as Jesus grew up, she would have had a strong sense of serving her Messiah with her ordinary household role. When she cooked, she was cooking for her Messiah, when she did laundry, or fetched water from the well, it was a direct service unto God, raising a child unto the Lord, even more than what most mothers feel. (Col. 3:23)

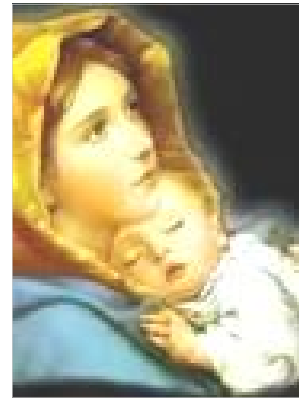
After Jesus' resurrection she seems to have been rather quietly involved in the early church. She probably just blended in at first, one of the women followers of "the Way." She may have even wondered how she could

possibly serve the Lord, now that she was no longer needed to do the household things for Him, and of what use she could be.

It was some time after the church started up that the disciples began to realize how important it was to not only preach, but to write down the things about Jesus' life and sayings so that people would have an accurate record of them. (Luke 1:1-4) They needed to show how his life had fulfilled Scripture. And people would have wanted to know if Jesus had been special in the beginning as a child. As the church grew and local bodies gathered everywhere, it became important that this information was transmitted accurately to everyone.

Mary was the only one able to contribute the details recorded about Jesus prior to his public ministry and the events before and after his birth. The two different sets of details are the most likely the results of two separate interviews with Mary, one with Luke and the other with Matthew.

Luke makes sure to give her credit: Luke 2:19 "But Mary treasured up all these words, pondering in her heart what they might mean." And, lest we miss the point, Luke repeats it to us: Luke 2:51b "But his mother kept all these things in her heart." The entire Christmas story that Christians of all centuries have had is owed to the memories that Mary kept in her heart.

'Twas the Night Jesus Came

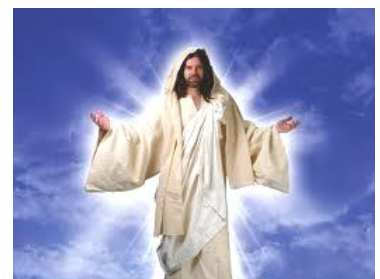
'Twas the night Jesus came
