Inmate's voice!

Inmates speak out for the need for a Restoration Program.

Rehoboth Jail & Prison Ministry, in an effort to better explain the need for a Restoration House Program, recently asked inmates to give some reasons. In the next several newsletters we will share some of these letters. Here is the first one just as it was written.

Being in prison for 17 plus years you will hear a lot of stories about what a person is going to do and what they have waiting on them once released.

Those that have a short time will usually have some one waiting for them. And those that are waiting will be able to provide support for them.

But then you have ones that have been in long time. Although some or most come in with support, as the years pass by that support fades away.

Those that have parent usually one or both will not be there in the end. Your sibling (s) slowly drift away and maybe receiving a letter or two a year and/or a Christmas card. It is like the world stands still for those in here. Those on the outside are greatly influenced by it. It is like waking up to a new world. We are in a different world in here where nothing seems to change except your sheets and your hair turns gray.

The outside support ages different because they grow and have their lives being in the world with all the world's problems. Being in here you don't have that kind of problem. If there are children, they too are out there chasing the American dream.

Remember those close friends you had in high school or 15-20 years ago, where are they now? Some friends stay together but most separate and lose contact, there is like a wall that separates us.

Think about those that didn't have that support team at first. They only had one parent and they're gone, one or no sibling who have distance themselves or the children that was young who don't know you as a father or dad?

If these men were released with no support they have a greater chance to fail, and reentering the system creating a greater burden for the tax payers. With a Halfway or Restoration House their chances of failure is a lot less or, you could say the pendulum would swing back the other way. This would truly benefit everyone. If you would please give me another minute or two of your time, let me explain in brief what a Restoration House would provide for these men.

I) first is financial assistance; NO!! money will be given them let me explain. Once they come to the House their room, food would be provided. But they have to earn their keep at first by working around the House until other work is found for them. Once they are working they will pay a certain percentage to the House for their keep. The House also will help in finding a job, help with transportation, clothing, etc. Also the House will provide classes in how to manage their money.

Please note I'm only giving you a very brief description of what is totally involved in each subject mention here. I'm only trying to give you a taste what is required or need for a person to survive once they are released.

2) Adjustment period: We are by nature creatures of habit and to

change a prison lifestyle does take time. This adjustment isn't bad but the longer a person does time the harder it will take to change that habit. Our biological clock within us must also be changed or reset. This House will not push someone into something that they are not ready for. Each person will be look at as an individual bases. By pushing someone would only end up in failure.

3) the emotional and mental support: This House will develop a close relationship and have moral support for these men in their adjustment period. There will be daily counseling. In this they will discuss their daily activities. In doing this it will let them express their feeling without the fear of someone of bringing a rod of iron upon them Allowing these issues to be brought out in the open will help to stop any trouble that might arise. The House will provide guidance and insight in how to handle any situation that might arise. The House staff and those staying at the house will be a part of this process.

4) I believe or I know that the greatest support comes from the Spiritual realm. This House will provide that Spiritual need for each individual. That Spiritual need not only will come from the examples that they see from the staff but also from what they are being taught from the Holy WORD. Please let me reintegrate, this is only a very brief description of each these issues that was cover. Prayerfully this will give you a taste of what is needed for these men.

Let's teach these men how to fish.



Needs of the Ministry

One of the main needs of this ministry is land and finances for a building a Restoration House in order to begin a 12-month program for men who have been incarcerated for a long period of time. Since we would like to be able to add to the buildings, we are asking God for 100 acres or more to begin. The program will basically begin with a building which will hold 14 to 20 men and these men will live there for 12 months or until the staff feels he is ready to re-enter society, but not until he has paid off his restitution, court costs, and fines. We will teach him and his family to budget their finances, if this was a problem for them in the past. Church, Bible study, and devotional time will be mandatory and there will be detailed records kept as to the residents'

attitude, work habits, and how well he interacts with the other men at the house and the staff. When this program has proved itself to be successful and a benefit to the residents and society, we want to then build another building for women. It will be staffed by women volunteers and one paid Director of Operations. Later on as these two programs become self supporting, we want to build a church on this land. This church will also act as a Christian school during the week and will be a place for a food and clothing ministry where the needs of the community will be met as well as a place to help disaster victims and actually house families who have lost their home to a disaster until something can be done to get them back into permanent homes. I have

been praying for this dream for 21 years and I continue to receive negative responses from some people; however, I have not heard a no from God yet. Perhaps I will hear a yes from Him soon, perhaps through someone who reads this newsletter. In the next several newsletters, we will be sharing rough drawings and even some blueprints of the buildings and property. Pray for this to become a reality to help a dream come true.

Pen Pal Outreach

Recently, as I was giving a presentation of the outreaches of this ministry, I had a lady ask about the Pen Pal outreach and she said she would be willing to try to write someone and see if she could share God's good news with a fellow Christian. I am in the process of getting her a Pen Pal. Over the years I have set up many people with Pen Pals and most of them have worked out very well. especially once I explain to both the

inmate and the Pen Pal the rules of writing letters, and more importantly, the purpose and restrictions. It really hurts me when I think an inmate is an earnest child of God, and I get him or her together with a Pen Pal, and they try to get money sent to them. This does not happen often, but it has happened, so I try to address it regularly. I also suggest to the inmate and the volunteer that they do not get involved with the expensive phone

calls and that they stick to letters, after all that is what a Pen Pal outreach is all about. If the volunteer decides to visit, I feel as a family group it is an excellent move, especially if the inmate plans on moving to the same area as the Pen Pal and become a member of that church. Anytime you try to do something good someone will try to use it for the wrong purpose so be careful and remember God knows your heart.

- 5. I am also responding to many questions now by letter since we do not have time before and after the study.
- 6. Several men who recently got released (one from BCC and one from DCC) called me several days after they were released and both are doing well. One is in NC and the other close enough to visit my church and give a testimony soon.
- 7. I have a 6-page prayer list that is growing very fast as I pray for these people every morning during my devotional time.
- 8. Please remember my family, this ministry, and me in your prayers as well.
- 9. We have someone working on a professional blueprint of Restoration House that should be available very soon.
- 10. Pray for the men who are going up for parole every year; for mercy from the parole board.

What is the topic for the Bible study we are studying?

- I. The Title of the Bible study is, "What Does Jesus Say About Salvation?".
- 2. Through the help of John Mac-Arthur's book, "The Gospel According to Jesus" I have gone through the Bible and we are studying what Jesus says one needs to do to be saved and how a saved person responds to God.
- 3. I have about 2/3 of the study ready and it is about 20 pages back and front typed, so it promised to be the longest study so far by the time it is completed.
- 4. We started this study at DCC March 26th and at BCC on April 28th.

The initials BCC stands for Buckingham Correctional;

Monday and Wednesday services are Bible Studies DCC stands for Dillwyn Corrections Center RJPM stands for Rehoboth Jail& Prison Ministry; PF stands for Prison Fellowship

Sunday service and 5th Monday services are usually a Worship service.
