Perseverance of the Saints

Jude 1:24, 25 "Now unto him {God} that is able to keep you from falling, and to present [you] faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy., 25 To the only wise God our Saviour, [be] glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen."

In his study entitled "Perseverance of the Saints," John MacArthur says something as follows:

"This is a very strong statement that acknowledges that a true saint (believer) will <u>persevere until the</u> <u>end</u>, until the time of Christ. However, it is also clear how the saints are kept: <u>they are kept from falling</u> <u>by God</u> and <u>God is able to present</u> <u>them faultless</u>. Therefore it is not something we can boast about, since it is actually the Holy Spirit of God who accomplishes this task, so God should receive all the glory, honor, and praise.

<u>The perseverance of the saints</u> is sometimes called <u>the doctrine of</u> <u>eternal security</u> or is sometimes expressed as "<u>once saved always</u> <u>saved.</u>" All of these analogies are true, if they are understood in their entirety. This doctrine of the perseverance of the saints is one of the most important components of salvation, because if salvation is not eternal, all the other doctrines such as the doctrine of <u>election</u>, justification, sanctification, glorification, and <u>the calling of God</u> would be called into question.

The guarantee of the perseverance of the saints is from God, which is the only way we can keep from falling totally away from God.



Jesus saved Peter and He is the Savior of all whom God has called according to His purpose.

This is what makes salvation eternal. If it were not eternal, and man was responsible for keeping his salvation by his own efforts, he would certainly lose it. <u>He could not be saved</u> in his own power <u>nor could he persevere</u> on his own."

The Modern-Day Prodigal Son Shares His Story


