What We Learned in 27 Years of Service to God in Jails & Prisons

I remember very well going into the jails while waiting to be approved to go back into state prisons as a volunteer minister. It was on my mind to minister to inmates, after all that was the basis for prison ministry. Other than being polite to the staff I had little or no thought of trying to minister to any staff members.

Then later came Liberty University. I took two courses having to do with ministering within the criminal justice system. In this same class were chaplains, there was a prosecuting attorney, a couple of police officers and a sheriff. In these two courses I learned something I should have known as a Christian. It was my duty to represent Jesus to EVERYONE I came in contact with, yes, even the staff or a prosecuting attorney, if I came in contact with any. I guess deep down I could not see how a prosecuting attorney or a sheriff could want in-

mates to be saved. I had a lot to learn, and I did not learn it all in the 80 hours of class time. I had come into ministry with a prejudice toward the authorities, thinking about the very ungodly ones I had contact with in my criminal past. I was doing the same thing toward police officers, correctional officers, attorneys, and judges that I had seen behave in an unchristian manner toward inmates. I was putting them all in one category not allowing for any good to be seen in any of them.

I am very thankful for God changing my heart to have compassion on others as God has shown me forgiveness and compassion. In these 27 years of ministry I have run into prison staff who couldn't care less about inmates. These staff members were there for a pay check, it was a job, and Christian programs and volunteers which caused a little more work were a nuisance to

them and, in their eyes, a waste of time. I could sometimes see the lack of compassion for inmates and volunteers by many staff members and officials over the years.

Then there are those staff and officials who would go out of their way to see that the programs got started on time, treating the volunteers with much kindness. How can I put all of these people in one basket, any more than society can categorize all inmates in one basket because all they ever hear about is the crimes committed and the ones who re-offend. Why don't more people hear of inmates who get out of prison after one or even two incarcerations and succeed in a wonderful way, giving back to society much more than they ever took away? Let's pray God allows us the same compassion and forgiveness toward others that God has shown each of us.

It is widely taught that Jesus died for everyone's sins. Indeed, God is "not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." Have you had a chance to enjoy Rehoboth's Pen Pal Ministry?

I have been writing inmates in the VA prisons since the ministry started 27 years ago. It started with writing inmates who got transferred from the prisons I visit to other VA prisons. So from writing the prisons I visited weekly, the writing went statewide. As I mentioned a while back, several Christian pen pal ministries no longer provide that service, it seemed to be very hard to get families interested who

are not too busy to volunteer, so those ministries no longer supply pen pals. So men started looking to other ministries for someone to write to them. Many men do not have family out here so a kind encouraging Christian letter could help change a life. In the search for pen pals other ministries came across our website and men began writing asking for someone to write. We got our first request from out-of-

state in 2012 and they continue to come daily. I have 11 pen pals writing male inmates and 6 ladies writing female inmates. I do not get a lot of female inmates, but I have 138 male inmates on my pen pal list which I could use some help with. If any men or families are interested in writing men, look for the Pen Pal Brochure on our website and contact us. I promise, you will get as much out of this as they will
